



Welcome to my Spring / Early Summer Update

This time in a slightly different format!





I don't have to remind you that it's been a very wet autumn, winter and early spring with record amounts of rainfall.

The picture to the left shows the irrigation reservoir at the end of last September 2023 – virtually ¾ empty.





And this picture was taken a couple of weeks ago! We have had thousands of m3 of rainwater on our course – The reservoir has never been this full to the point of overflowing – but the rain keeps falling! Although the irrigation system is primed up and ready to go, we haven't needed to use is so far.....





We have been able to get on with a lot of projects during this past off season. The bunker on the approach to 3rd North green was one of them.

Work started last October with the removal of the original timber facias and the introduction of a links style 'revet' face.





Slowly but surely the face was constructed, and the bunker base was shaped up and connected to the drainage.

Despite all the rain we were able to pick our moments and progress forwards.....





Area turfed and knitting in. Base prepared awaiting a dry period for sand.

We introduce sand at 50mm depth to start with and follow up with two applications of 25mm to build up the bunker surface.





The finished product!

We all think this style of bunkering is visually effective and like the true links style.

We will be looking to do more in the future.





This year fairway drainage has been a priority.

We identified areas (and there are many) where additional drainage would be helpful. Overall, we have installed more than 500m of secondary drainage in known areas. You will see our work on the 1st, 5th and 10th holes.





We trenched these areas systematically – added 100mm drainage pipe to a positive outlet then overlaid with gravel and rootzone.

Catch basins were strategically placed to maximise the drainage and catchment area.





Some areas we trenched to a local soak away which allowed us to pick up on large surface areas.

Each drainage run was different, but I'm pleased to report they are working well.





Very pleased with the outcome and the immediate benefits from better drainage.

Our plan is to continue this process during the winter months, focusing on the known wetter areas. It's a time-consuming task but the benefits far outweigh.





A few weeks on and the turf recovery over the new drainage runs is very good.

All these types of works are ongoing, they are a little inconvenient for the golfer but in the long run assist our ability to play the course all year round.





We hollow cored and slit our greens early this year and for once were lucky with the weather during that week.

Doing renovations earlier in the year offers us the opportunity for a less intrusive renovations in August when our green surfaces are at their best.





The left-hand side edge of the lake on the North 2nd hole has suffered subsidence and you will see that this has now been repaired.

We have taken the opportunity to fill in the farleft bunker as well. Our plan is to adjust the centerline of the hole slightly to the right so that the lake is further left when playing the hole. Either way it has been a good repair and will support the surrounding soils.





Last October we regraded, levelled and re-turfed the 13th tees (East 4). The back and middle tees had become uneven, so we took the opportunity to level them and, in that process, enlarged them as well.





Pleased to report the turves have all knitted in and made for two super new teeing grounds.

Again, our ongoing plan is to address other tees that require this type of work.





Essex Golf Union celebrates its Centenary this year and Ingrebourne Links is hosting the inaugural CENTENARY CUP – 9th & 10th July.


